

North Wagner Family

Olof Peter eldest son of Johannes Olofsson and Christina Hjelm. B 1851 in Otterstads Sockna Skara boys Län Sweden. Taught 1st & 2nd grades near his home. Emigrated to U.S. 1871. with several companions. Took up a homestead in Maine, sold it and came to Bay City. In 1876 he returned to Sweden to visit his mother, after a short visit he returned to the U.S. Worked in ship yard, entered politics served 3 terms as Mayor of Bay City. He and his brother Carl bought 200 acres of land in Bangor, Meap and built a home there. Married Alice Pratt. Eight children born of this union. Carl Johnny Jessie Elmer Oliver Albert Arvid + Alice

When Olof Peter came here he changed his name from Olofson or Olson to Lind. The reason there were so many Olofsons Olsons and Johnsons, he thought it would be conflict for business affairs & mail to continue with the old name.

(Daughter)

Maria Mathilda (Olofson) Lind B 1854 same place as above. Was 1st elementary school teacher in home parish. Entered a dairy school at 19 yrs age. Worked at several places for 9 yrs. Father died 2 1/2 yrs after I had left home, so in 1880 my widowed mother and the 3 youngest children sailed for America to be with the eldest son Olof Peter. In 1882 in the spring I too decided to leave for America to be with my people here, after a voyage of 20 days 12 days over the Atlantic and 8 days from Göteborg to England. Married Frans Sundquist in 1883, settled on a farm in Williams Township. Ten children born of this union.

Born 1860 - Ullerud Otterstads socken Skara borgs Län. Came to Bay City with widowed mother, brother Carl & sister Neolina (1880 - Oct) worked at Wheeler Ship yard, became foreman in pattern dept (mould loft) Later he accepted positions at ship yards at Collingwood Can. Lake Superior, Nubar Rouge. Came back to Bay City and built cruises and yachts for Harry Defoe at a small yard west side of Sagshaw river. Defoe moved to the East side and began building larger ships, expanded the ship yard to accommodate the building of war ships for the U.S. Navy. Johan was made Superintendent of the yard which position he held until his death of pneumonia Oct 16th 1924.

Married Amanda Hjellberg Dec 4 - 1886. She came from Tida Holm Vester götland. Four children were born of this union.

Julia Neolina, daughter of Johannes Olofson B. 1866 (same place as other children) Came to U.S. in 1880 with mother and brothers. Married Johan Larson a sailor from Thorsö Maristad. Married 10 months when he died of Typhoid. Son born 1896 after father's death. She worked as a seamstress, went to Calif. After a few years she sent for her son who was being trained by Estrandma Lind. She died of influenza 1920 and is buried at Engelwood Cal.

These two were twins
Carl & Julia

Carl Theodore, another son of Johannes Olofson & Christina Hjelm B. 1866. Came to U.S. with mother Johan & Julia Neolina 1880. He and his brother Felix operated a grocery store at St. Louis & Marquette St. also worked as a carpenter under the ship yard. After his mother's death he moved to Calif. became a foreman during the war years 1914-1918 at govt Navy yard at Mare Island also at San Pedro navy yard. Lived with his twin sister until her death & with Roy her son until he died 1920.

Hi Walter (Lind)

(Malina Niolina Larson)

Here is a resume, how things were at 912 Litchfield before you came to live with us. Dad began building in 1892, and we moved in. I just a month before Fred was born. Apr 1st 1893. The lot was purchased from Aunt Lena (who was a widow) her husband a sailor had been lost at sea just two months before Roy was born. The upstairs was not finished when we moved in, so we used the music room for a bed room. Dad and Ed Pierson worked nights to finish the up stairs.

The dining room as we knew it in later years, was our kitchen, a sink and pump stood in the S. E. corner and we pumped rain water from the cistern ^{that was} in the basement. There was a small pantry off the kitchen to the east. How well I remember looking thru the pantry window at our small veg-garden, and the grape vines, which produced those large white Niagara grapes. Life went on as usual until sister Ellen arrived. I was then transferred up stairs to sleep. One up stairs room we used as a play room. Fred, Roy, myself and

a few neighbor² kids played school mostly; with me as the teacher writing all over the white plastered walls. Well that was soon put a stop to and I am sure I was punished and Dad built us a play house near the barn. Oh yes we had a cow for a spell, kept her in the barn during cold weather and in a pasture on Henry St during the summer. Her name was Shona. Every morning and night poor Mother had the chore of milking the cow, walking to the pasture with Ellen in the buggy Fred and I dragging behind. I can still hear Ellen calling the cow as we neared the pasture. We kids sure were milk fed, and we even sold milk at 4 cts a qt to our neighbors.

The year 1900 Dad was offered a job to lay out boats for the Collingwood Ship Bldg Co. a much larger salary than the Wheeler Ship Bldg Co. was paying so off he went. After a few months away he wrote and wanted us to come there. so Mother started packing. How she did it I really dont understand. 3 kids to take along, the cow to dispose of and the house. But Grandma Shellberg offered to

stay in the house while we were gone and Uncle Charlie who lived next door with Aunt Lena and Grandma Lind helped to pack and crate. We took beds, bedding, clothing, dishes, kitchen utensils, a few chairs and away we went on the train to Collingwood. I can still remember sitting almost half the night waiting for a train into Sarnia. There was no bridge or tunnel at that time so our train had to cross on a ferry. We stored our organ at Norths and Grandma lived only in the kitchen closed off the other rooms in the house.

Well! in Canada we lived quite ritzy, moved into a new home, and Dad bought new furniture even rented a grand piano so I could take lessons. Dad was quite the man, in that small town so he had to keep up with the Jones's and we made many friends on account of Dad's job. Incidentally, we took a trip to Collingwood last year. I found the house where we had decided on St Mary St. The town of course had grown, new bldgs had taken the place of old ones, the ship yard was still there as was the church where I had attended Sunday

School, after a little more than a year. Mother wanted to go back to Bay City, she was lonely for her friends and besides you were about to be born and she wanted you to be born in the U.S., so every thing was packed and away we went leaving Dad as he had to stay to finish his work. He worked hard to crate the furniture he had bought as Mother was bound to have (the dining room furniture especially) with us. (mother's sister)

(Källberg)
A short time after we were back at 912, there was a wedding at our house. (Aunt Mary & Andrew Patterson). Dad came home shortly before you were born and got a job at wheelers again. The organ was sold to Aunt Emma ^(Johnson) and the piano was purchased, and a bicycle was bought for me. On Memorial Day 1902 I rode up to Grandma Shellberg, (she lived on S. Dean) with some home baked articles and found her dead on the couch. She was buried a few days later from our place. Dad built a ^{row} boat and on Sunday after noon the family was tripped to a trip on Saginaw river. Along about this time I came down with scarlet fever so we were quarantined for 28 days but Dad was allowed to go to work. Mother now decided, as our family was increasing, a kitchen should

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be added to the house, so that and a
bath room was built, also a bay
window added to the living room
and later the side porch was enlarged

I graduated from Park School
about this time, and went into High
School. Another offer came from
Collingwood for Dad (1904 or 1905)
so again he left us. His trunk
containing his clothes was stolen at
the depot in Canada and never traced
and mind you 5 years later, it was
sent to us (the lock had been broken)
but not a thing missing. When Dad
was finished in Collingwood, he
went to Lake Superior and from
then on to about 1913 he worked at
several out of town shipyards
and our dear mother had to be both
parents to us. She worked too hard
and I really believe that is why
she died so young. She did all the
work in that big house. the coal
stove had to be cleaned and put up
every fall and taken down in the
spring all the storm doors and
windows put up and taken down;
we kids were not much help.
Well for one thing we were never in
want, our folks were great for
buying in quantities: a barrel of
flour, sugar and crackers in the
attic, a half pig (salted), 10 bushels
potatoes, a bushel cabbage, a crock of
Dill also several bushels of Northern

(barrel of salted fish)

fall.

This should be enough
reminscing. you were old enough
at this stage to know just
about as much about affairs as
I did so will close

P.S. Do you remember when you
broke your leg sliding on the ice
at Gobin School? also the seige
you had with Typhoid fever. I
had to stay at Norths during the
time. Cant remember where Fred
and Ellen stayed.
